
Sherwood Forest Map, C. 1334



"Clipstone Peel was built in the months preceding January 1317...The river below the peel was diverted to make pasture..." (Crook 1976)

"The forest map indicates that it also included a pond, probably formed by damming the river, called 'Peel Water'." (Crook 1976)





















Hatched triangle between Spa Ponds and interesting feature. Source: Ordnance Survey (1897)









"But when the water was first thrown over the ground, new and unforeseen difficulties had to be provided against. The water found its way into the old rabbitholes, and burst out in springs. All such unsound spots had to be dug out and rammed into firm ground."

"It has been said, that the difficulties of draining the boggy valley far exceeded the labour on the hill-sides...irrigation increased the strength of the springs so much, that in many cases the draining has had to be done twice over."




Looking from where Pond 4 is being created towards Packman's Bridge and Spa Lane







HOW THE SPA PONDS HAVE CHANGED OVER 180 YEARS (1835-2015)

Spring at south of Pond 2 (T Davison, 1995)





